She questions, "How can we work so that we're actually working with the laws of nature instead of against them?" reflecting her commitment to agriculture that works in harmony with the environment.

Extending Sustainable Practices Beyond the Orchard

Christine's advocacy for sustainable practices extends beyond her farm. She engages consumers and fellow farmers, supporting initiatives such as the Monarch Joint Venture, the California Almond Stewardship Program (CASP), and engaging in Blue Diamond Grower's Coop Orchard Stewardship Incentive Program (OSIP).
